**Generic Marking Principles**

These general marking principles must be applied by all examiners when marking candidate answers. They should be applied alongside the specific content of the mark scheme or generic level descriptors for a question. Each question paper and mark scheme will also comply with these marking principles.

**GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 1:**

Marks must be awarded in line with:

- the specific content of the mark scheme or the generic level descriptors for the question
- the specific skills defined in the mark scheme or in the generic level descriptors for the question
- the standard of response required by a candidate as exemplified by the standardisation scripts.

**GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 2:**

Marks awarded are always **whole marks** (not half marks, or other fractions).

**GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 3:**

Marks must be awarded **positively**:

- marks are awarded for correct/valid answers, as defined in the mark scheme. However, credit is given for valid answers which go beyond the scope of the syllabus and mark scheme, referring to your Team Leader as appropriate
- marks are awarded when candidates clearly demonstrate what they know and can do
- marks are not deducted for errors
- marks are not deducted for omissions
- answers should only be judged on the quality of spelling, punctuation and grammar when these features are specifically assessed by the question as indicated by the mark scheme. The meaning, however, should be unambiguous.

**GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 4:**

Rules must be applied consistently, e.g. in situations where candidates have not followed instructions or in the application of generic level descriptors.

**GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 5:**

Marks should be awarded using the full range of marks defined in the mark scheme for the question (however; the use of the full mark range may be limited according to the quality of the candidate responses seen).

**GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 6:**

Marks awarded are based solely on the requirements as defined in the mark scheme. Marks should not be awarded with grade thresholds or grade descriptors in mind.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <i>Marks are awarded positively to demonstrate positive achievement, rather than penalising for an incorrect/incomplete response.</i></li> <li>• <i>Where the sense of the translation is less clear, examiners should give credit for elements that are correct (according to the agreed mark scheme).</i></li> <li>• <i>Glossed words will have no value for meaning alone.</i></li> <li>• <i>Active passive interchange is allowed but must be complete – i.e. no missing agent.</i></li> <li>• <i>Candidates are expected to render the translation passage into sensible English and not rely on a word-for-word substitution translation.</i></li> </ul>		
<b>Specimen translation</b>		
<i>(This is one possible translation of the passage. Examiners will credit all acceptable variants.)</i>		
<p>There once occurred an event small indeed, but which became a very great argument. For some senators said that the Oppian Law must be abolished. Under this law, no woman in war time should have more than half an ounce of gold, neither should she wear pretty clothes, nor be carried in a carriage in town, except for the purpose of public rites. Other senators were saying that the Oppian Law ought not to be abolished. The women could not be kept at home by any authority or power of their husbands: they sat in the streets begging the men who were walking to the forum to allow their wives' jewellery to be returned to them. This crowd of women grew larger by the day, and very many gathered from the country. But the harshest of all the senators was the consul, M. Porcius Cato, who spoke passionately in favour of the Oppian Law as follows: 'If women win today, what will they not attempt tomorrow? As soon as they begin to think of themselves as equal, they will become even more bold.'</p>
